Ms. Childress will present strategies to target verbal language, expansion of language, functional use of communication, as well as implementation of augmentative and alternative communication systems.

This webcast will provide an overview of social competence including the definition, skills, and competencies that comprise social competence and common outcomes for those with ASD who struggle in this area. Dr. Conroy will describe how to assess social functioning and will outline strategies and interventions. A focus will be placed on implementation of interventions that fit into a hierarchical framework that includes classroom wide intervention, natural supports, and explicit instruction.

- **Topic:**Planning your Student's Program Using the Comprehensive Autism Planning
System (CAPS)
- **Presenter:** Shawn Henry, Ph.D. Ohio Center for Autism and Low Incidence (OCALI)

<u>Webcast Description</u>: This webcast will provide an overview of the Comprehensive Autism Planning System (CAPS). CAPS is an easy-to-use system that allows educators to understand how and when to implement an instructional program for students with autism spectrum disorders (ASD). The CAPS model helps the educational team develop a plan to implement a student's Individualized Education Plan (IEP) effectively. The CAPS model answers the following questions. (1) What supports does my student/child need in each class to be successful? (2) What goals is my student/child working on? (3) Is there a thoughtful sequence to the student's/child's day for implementation of instruction? Dr. Henry will lead participants through the CAPS process which includes the use of natural opportunities and supports to ensure student success as well as data collection to measure that success.

- **Topic:**Research Based Intervention: Ensuring Program Quality for Students with
Autism Spectrum Disorder
